I'm not sure what's wrong in America. I imagine you can't, either. I'm writing this to see if I can begin to

work out the reason. This morning I got up and did my morning thing. Say hi to the dogs, get some coffee, feed the dogs, let them out to poop, get some more coffee, read through the preposterous number of emails on my phone, and then... go work out. I backed my wife's car out of the garage and got everything ready. I then sat on a stool and stared at my squat rack for like 15 minutes. I was frozen, and the weak part of my brain was winning the debate. This conversation was happening in my brain, and I just seemed to be a passive observer. Then, something happened, and I stood up. I put the bar on the rack to warm up. I then stared at the bar for about 3 minutes - quite a while to just stare. Again, something happened, and I put the bar on my shoulders and did ten squats. I put the bar back and resumed staring. It was like I was being pulled away from the workout and had to just stay there until I began acting again. Finally, I got my workout going but had to literally curse at the bar for each lift. I was hellbent on doing it despite the weak part of my brain seeming to have the upper hand that morning. In the end, I got it done and felt like a million bucks afterward.

Why do I say all this? I say it because, despite us collectively being unable to put our finger on what's going wrong in America, I think what I'm seeing is we, as Americans, are acting like me in my garage. Something is up, and our brains, maybe it's a self-defense mechanism, keep us from acting. Maybe we just go along down this path that we know is wrong and do nothing different because it feels safer. That has to stop. My workout was hard. All of them are. I do them, and afterward, I feel like I can conquer the world. On the other hand, Americans have, quite literally, conquered the world. Every other country aspires to be like us. We live in the greatest nation ever to grace God's green Earth. Yet, we are all moping around. The news and social media have us at each other's throats. We obsess over things far away and ignore the things nearby that we can control. We judge first before seeing another's actions. We spend far too much time keeping up with celebrities and invest far too little time with family, friends, and neighbors. We avoid going outside and seeing the real world in favor of wasting time in the digital world. In short, technology is messing up our priorities and making us soft.

We need to be hard. America was built by hard men and women. Can you imagine the horrors of getting in a wagon with your wife, kids, and some supplies in the 1850s and just heading West? No roads, no hospitals, no McDonalds, and there were all kinds of things actively trying to kill you both night and day. Can you imagine? And that's just one tiny sliver of the hard things previous Americans endured to make us who we are today. This story I'm about to share now sounds pathetic, but I will tell it anyhow. Years ago, I was approached by the assistant principal of my daughter's elementary school to see if I would help her start a club called DOGS (Dads of Great Students). The club was to encourage dads to spend more time at school and be more engaged with their kids' education. The assistant principal showed me studies of how when dads are more engaged with school, their kids have all kinds of long-term benefits. So, I agreed to help and, shortly thereafter, found myself having to speak in front of fifty dads in the school cafeteria. I had never spoken in public, and right before it was my turn, I basically freaked out. I took the microphone in my hand and noticed they were uncontrollably shaking. I had to put both hands on the microphone and hold it tight against my chest to keep my hands still. I was able to speak, with a bit of a waver in my voice at first, but I got my point across, and we had a bunch of dads sign up for the club that very morning. It was a success, and I had a spring in my step the rest of that week. I did something that to me was terrifying, I survived, and was much better for it. I thought a lot about that speech in the next couple of weeks, and the lesson I got from it was that getting far out of your comfort zone is scary but also incredibly empowering. Since then, I have hosted and spoken at large events with distinguished business leaders and politicians. These events would never have happened if I hadn't forced my reluctant legs to walk up the stairs of that school's cafeteria stage years ago.

Where I'm going with all this is that I'm beginning to think we Americans are going through an entirely new and a bit frightening digital age and, as a result, are choosing to remain in our comfort zone. What we're experiencing has never happened before, so we have no history to guide us. Things keepchanging, and the pace of change gets faster and faster. So, we're kind of just sitting around and watching. Sure, there are some people acting, but most are watching.

America has always been filled with people of action, but we're not acting anymore. We've become passive and are letting the weak part of our brains take control. That's not us. That is not what made us great. Listen, technology and constant change are not going away. If you're looking for things to go back to "normal," that is not going to happen. What's the solution? That is entirely up to you, but I have some suggestions. Find whatever your version is of my barbell and curse at it. Then act. Do something. Put your phone down. Think about how you can make your own neighborhood better and then make it happen. Call some friends you have not spoken with in far too long. Tell some stupid dad jokes to your coworkers and have an easy laugh. Start looking for a political candidate that you feel actually represents your values, call their office, and ask how you can help. That pothole you hate - take ten minutes to find out the number for your local Department of Transportation and call them to have it fixed. See where I'm going with all this? None of these are actually that hard to do it's just that, in this moment, they FEEL very hard. What I am suggesting is to start doing the things we all used to do. It's like the past three years have lulled us all into sleep, and it's now time to wake up. It is going to be hard at first, and that's fine. According to a number of polls, the vast majority of Americans do not like the direction we are heading. So, I say it's past time to stop wishing things would change. We're known for doing hard things, and we're up to this task. Getting out of this comfort zone we're all stuck in will lead us to something better and get America going in the right direction again. So, I say go curse at your version of a barbell and start turning things around for the better in this great America. 🌞

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
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Hurricane Preparedness for Pets By Dr. Veja Tillman, DVM

With every hurricane we learn new lessons about being prepared and disaster planning. Hurricane Ian was no exception. It gave us a stark reminder to always be prepared and plan early and to not take warnings lightly. Hurricane season in southwest Florida starts June 1st. Let's get our pets emergency and disaster ready before the next hurricane strikes. They are a part of the family too!

GET A PET EMERGENCY KIT

A collection of basic supplies that you may need in the event of an emergency.

- Food and water for at least 3 days. On average, companion pets require a minimum of 1-2 oz of water per pound per day. However, If your pet has special medical conditions, is very active or pregnant, the water requirement will be greater.
- Pet medications (2 weeks supply replaced often to maintain their quality based on expiration dates.) Remember to plan for any medications that may need to be refrigerated.
- Pet First Aid Kit these can easily be found online. However, consult your veterinarian, if your pets has any specific conditions that may require additional items for this kit
- Updated Pet Identification (microchip, ownership documentation, your contact information, pictures of you and your pet together, etc). Have digital copies as well as printed copies. Store copies in digital cloud storage as well as have them downloaded to your cell phone to allow several methods to access them.

Make sure that your pets' microchip is registered, and your contact information is updated.

- Updated vaccination documents (include the name of your veterinarian with telephone number, address and email)
- Portable crate or pet carrier, harness, or leash/collar
- Pet litter and litter box, paper towels, plastic bags, cleaning supplies
- Familiar items (favorite toys, bedding, treats, etc) to help calm your pet during the storm while at home or in a shelter.
- Assemble kit in an easy-to-carry, waterproof tote; stored in an easily accessible area away from extreme temperature changes and keep this kit in a designated place ready in case you must leave home/ work quickly. Make sure all family members know where the kit is kept.
- Consult your veterinarian for advice on making a pet emergency kit that is appropriate for your pet's individual needs.
- Evacuate immediately, if told to evacuate.
- DO NOT LEAVE YOUR PET in an evacuation zone or if you evacuate your home. Many pets are tragically lost waiting for their owners to return and rescue them. Take your pet to a safe place outside of danger zone or to a pet storm safe shelter (boarding facility) ahead of time if you are in an evacuation zone or warnings have been issued for your area. Remember, that pets may often hide in difficult to reach places when they are afraid, which makes it difficult to get them and yourself to safety.
- Identify family or friends who

will be willing to take you and your pets in during and/or after an emergency.

- Locate hotels that are pet friendly outside of the evacuation/ emergency area.
- Research local boarding facilities that are emergency shelters for pets, incase you are not able to evacuate with your pet. Remember to call ahead and reserve space for your pet to stay before and during and a few days after the storm.
- Talk to your pet's veterinarian about emergency planning, especially if your pet has medical conditions that require consistent monitoring and supervision.
- Gather contact information for animal emergency treatment facilities locally and outside of the emergency zone. Remember to program these phone numbers (along with the name and address of the facility) into your phone.
- Make sure everyone in the family knows that hurricane plan for your pet(s). Include who will pick up the pet and safe meeting places for the family outside of the emergency zone. Make sure all members of the family learn and practice the emergency plan.

AFTER THE STORM

- Pay attention to the authorities for information and instructions.
- Return home only when authorities say it is safe and damage and risks in the area have been evaluated and cleared.
- Leave your pet(s) in the shelters or boarding facilities for a

few days after the emergency to make sure that the home and environment is safe for them to return.

- Be aware of the risks and dangers of debris, displaced wildlife and downed powerlines in your area. This can be a danger to you and your pets.
- Use of a generator or other gasoline (diesel) -powered machinery ONLY outdoors and away from pets.

STAY INFORMED

- Be aware of the types of emergencies / disasters that can happen where you live and work.
- Sign up to receive local emergency alerts on your cell phone or email available through your city and county.
- Tune into your state and federal emergency management websites and social media for information from official sources.
- Become familiar with your local emergency response plan, evacuation routes, etc

Safety At The Gas Station, Addressing Speeding And **Reckless** Driving By Sheriff Carmine Marceno

Thefts at gas stations, across the United States, remain a concern for enforcement. law

Like many other crimes of opportunity, an unlocked vehicle with personal items in sight makes for a quick and easy target.

Whether you are simply distracted while pumping gas or inside paying, thieves wait for the opportunity to quickly open your vehicle door and grab anything and everything of value.

Car thieves sit in waiting for the opportunity to occupy and steal a running and/or unlocked vehicle.

Many elect to use their refueling time as an opportunity to catch up on missed text messages, listening

to voice mail and returning phone calls. These distractions make one an easier target.

Choosing well-lit fuel stations with surveillance cameras decrease the appeal to criminals.

Whenever possible, purchase fuel during daytime hours and do so from a station that offers significant visibility to the roadway. Select a pump closest to the structure. This increases your visibility to cashiers and staff that work inside. Additionally, due to their proximity to the register, these pumps are generally free of skimming devices.

Locking your vehicle doors and keeping valuables out of sight make it extremely difficult for thieves to enter your car or truck. Take your keys with you...do not leave them in the ignition or leave fobs on the seat.

Be certain to terminate your credit card transaction, at the pump, prior to leaving and ensure that the pump handle is fully seated in order to complete your transaction.

Avoid distractions. Be observant and aware of your surroundings. Take necessary precautions.

These operations will be conducted by both marked and unmarked units and will be staged at differing positions along and adjacent to the aforementioned roadways. 👋




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11th Annual Juneteenth Community Celebration Is Planned June 17 In Fort Myers **Submitted By Kathy Becker**

The Lee County Black History So- in Galveston, Texas, learned that they ciety, Dunbar Festival Committee and the African Coalition of Southwest Florida are partnering to host the 11th Annual Juneteenth Community Celebration at Roberto Clemente Park, 1936 Henderson Ave. in Fort Myers from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 17. The event is free to attend.

This year's Juneteenth Celebration will be filled with a variety of fun and entertainment for the entire family, including stage performances, music, arts and crafts, food and refreshments. Event attendees will also have a chance to receive free information from community businesses in wealth, health, education, job training, employment, housing, corporate and governmental services and more.

"It's a celebration day that we honor the fact that this ended slavery but also for us to understand the endurance of our people," said Charles Barnes, chairperson of the society. "Our ancestors went through that process and were successful and survived, so that we can be where we are today."

Juneteenth, which has been celebrated since the late 1800s was finally recognized as a federal holiday in 2021. A special historical exhibit about Florida's Emancipation Day May 20 and Juneteenth will be available at Williams Academy Black History Museum at Clemente Park at the festival and through the end of June.

Juneteenth is always observed on or around June 19, the day that slaves had been freed, more than two years after President Lincoln's Emancipation

On June 19, 1865, Major General Gordon Granger landed in Galveston and read General Order Number 3 to the people. Celebrations started in the following years as a way for former slaves to reconnect and recount the day their freedom was announced. Many of the first Juneteenth celebrations were held on the grounds of African American churches and eventually became more elaborate with rodeos, picnics, barbecues, fishing trips and family reunions.
