I was at the doctor's and was being

prepped for a little procedure. While being stabbed with needles filled with anesthetics, the nurse and I had an interesting conversation. It began with how a lot of people seem so tired, irritable, anxious, and just plain hopeless these days. Today, basically, everyone is racing around with too much to do, and everyone vou encounter is in the same boat. Yet, some seem quite happy, while others appear miserable.

We were wondering what had changed. Obviously, social media has an outsized influence on everyone. Even if you're not on it, you 100% know someone who is that will readily spout off all kinds of disturbing facts to you about the current state of the world. That behavior is a result of a computer program known as "The Algorithm," and it is widely understood now that social media realized a long time ago, using their algorithms to determine what works best for each user, that people stay on their phones much longer if fed unsettling content versus happy content. In short, the bad news keeps you glued to your phone, so social media companies, to stay profitable, make darn sure to keep your

outrage levels as high as possible. The other item is that we no longer have news organizations. We have propaganda arms based on capitalism. They feed their customers what they want to hear, regardless of the truth, because to keep their business afloat, they selectively cover news they know their customer base will like, and, again, it is rarely something positive. It's, I believe, unintentional, but this results in a divided populace despite us genuinely having so much in common. These two are compelling, but I have a more profound reason to offer.

I have a handful of people that I hold dear that, when speaking with them, I hear these words repeatedly: exhausted, anxious, tired, sad, angry. I feel terrible for them, and it's their own doing. I've nudged more than a few times that perhaps your "diet of news" could be the source, and maybe to put your phone down a whole lot more often. I'm told that is most certainly not the case, and it's just how awful everything is that bothers them. I read a fascinating article quite a while ago that hadn't sunk in until now. It said that this behavior of theirs is called a secular religion. Secular means, I had to look it up, "denoting attitudes, activities, or other things that have no religious or spiritual basis." Odd, right? A religion based on no religion! In time, it began to make sense because if you removed the higher power and beauty from religion, you would end up pretty miserable. Having to be faithful to a religion that can only offer outrage with no upside seems pointless and depressing.

In time, I found my groove and started to feel the songs rather than just recite the words. A bit further down the road, I had several moments of profound beauty that kind of snuck up on me, and I found myself quite emotional, which is not typical of me. The pastor said that was not uncommon and that she regularly sees tears of joy during a service. Now, she totally could just have been saying this so that I didn't feel like such a giant wuss, but I'm going to stick with her story. Also, the more I went, the better I got to know everyone, and in doing so, I realized we represented so many different walks of life, yet it sure felt like we were all a big family.

Ok, ok, I will get to my point. Our news and social media aren't doing us any favors. If you are finding yourself in a funk, I say, at a minimum, really re-think what you allow yourself to see each day. The solution here is easy - change. Blind Melon has a song with a great lyric – "When life is hard, you have to change." Being anxious and demoralized makes you think everything is happening TO you. It takes away the ability to realize that you are in control of your life and that change is possible. Finally, if you're truly miserable, GO to church. I triple-dog dare you! It will be odd initially but hang in there and stick around for a couple of months. I strongly feel that a lot of what was bothering you will be replaced by a newfound appreciation for life and your fellow man. You will WANT to be a better you, and in my book, trying to become just a little better each day is one of the most effective recipes for a better life. Both humans and religion have been around for thousands of years, and the benefits of faith have undoubtedly helped humans as a whole to grow and develop. So, regardless of whether you're in this secular religion, if you're feeling low, start going to different churches, find one you like, and then stick around for a while. Speaking from my own experience, I am confident you will not regret it!

## What Would We Do If a Boeing 737 Crashed at RSW Every Year? By Terri Lewis

Lee County continues to have an increasing number of fatalities on the roads. We *must* work together to reduce fatalities and serious injuries.

In 2022, there were 133 fatalities total. If we were best-in-class for safe roads, **120 people could have been with their families for the end-of-***year holidays*. These are unnecessary losses of lives. The total fatalities in Lee County are comparable to a Boeing 737 crashing at RSW every year. Think about how we would react if a plane crashed yearly at the airport!

If this trend continues, Lee County looks to set another increase in fatalities in 2023. We *must* reverse the trend. Our target must be zero.

We strongly encourage governmental agencies, law enforcement, and the community to come together to reduce crashes, focusing on enforcement & infrastructure.

On August 22nd, we plan to meet at the Florida Highway Patrol located at 10041 Daniels Pkwy to address this ill trend. We are asking for 133 volunteers to come dressed in black shirts. These people will lie on the ground, representing those who lost their lives in 2022. Those who have been injured or lost loved ones are encouraged to come dressed in red shirts, standing on the perimeter. All others are invited to attend to show support and engagement.

The press will look to interview attendees, especially those who have lost family members. Please note, those individuals will be asked to speak with law enforcement to ask them what they are doing to help reverse the trend. We encourage that people ask local governmental agencies what they are doing to make infrastructure safer for all users.

An overhead video will be shot with a drone capturing the event; these photos and videos will be made available online.

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## Keeping Pets Safe During the Summer Heat Wave

Just 4 Pets Wellness Center Keeping Pets Safe During the Summer Heat Wave Summertime is fun time! But with the extreme heat here in Southwest Florida, we must take extra special care of our pets to protect them from developing heatstroke.

Heatstroke is one of the most seen conditions of pets in the summertime. Heatstroke can occur when an animal's temperature rises to a critical level. Normal body temperatures for dogs and cats range from 100 to 102.5 degrees. Anything temperature greater than normal can put your pet at risk of developing this condition. Under extreme conditions, where a dog's temperature rises to 106 degrees (or a cats to 105 degrees) or higher they can suffer irreparable organ damage and even die.

Extreme temperatures can cause heatstroke. Some signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure, and unconsciousness.

Some conditions make pets more susceptible to developing heatstroke: very old or very young pets, pets that are overweight, pets with heart or respiratory disease, and breeds such as pugs, bulldogs, boxers, Shih Tzus and other dog or cat breeds with short muzzles will have a harder time breathing in extreme heat.

Here are some tips to help keep your pet safe from the heat this summer.

1. NEVER LEAVE OUR PET IN A PARKED CAR. Even with the windows rolled down, on an average summer day, a parked car can reach temperatures greater than 105 degrees within 10 minutes. After 30 minutes, the temperature will reach 120 degrees. So, do not take a chance on your pets' life. If it is too hot for you, it is too hot for your pet as well. Your pet may suffer irreversible organ damage or die due to the hot conditions.

- 2. LIMIT EXERCISE ON HOT DAYS. Try to limit exercise to the very early morning or late evenings to reduce the impact of the heat. Adjusting the amount of time and the intensity of the activity helps to reduce the impact of the heat on your pet. Be especially careful with pets with white coats or short snots as they will be especially susceptible to the development of sunburn, skin cancer and breathing problems due to prolonged exposure to the heat (and Sunlight).
- 3. HYDRATE YOUR PET OF-TEN. Always carry water to help keep your pet hydrated or make sure your pet always has access to fresh clean cool water. Stop your pet's playtime activity and offer cool water to help cool your pet from the inside. "Pup"sicles (Homemade ice cubes/ treats for pets) are a great treat for pets to snack on and cool off at the same time.
- 4. AVOID HOT SURFACES. Concrete and asphalt can reach temperatures hotter than the surrounding air. They also continue to release heat well after the sun has gone down. Hot concrete or asphalt can burn your pet's paws and skin severely. Avoid these ar-

eas, if possible, especially during the hottest parts of the day. If grassy or dirt covered areas (not sand, it gets very hot too!) are available for your pet to walk or play on opts for that instead of the sidewalk or asphalt.

5. WATCH FOR SIGNS OF HEAT STROKE. If you think your pet is suffering from heatstroke wet your pet's whole body (down to the skin) with cool water (DO NOT give your pet an ice bath!) and immediately take them to your veterinarian or the nearest emergency hospital for additional treatment Dr. Tillman is a 2002 graduate of Tuskegee University School of Veterinary Medicine. ## LAFCRD Recognizes Local Teen as a Community Youth Hero

Our District had a very special guest at Station 102 this evening! Chief DiLallo invited 14-year-old Hunter to visit the station after learning about how he took action during a fire emergency on July 4th of this year. Through social media, our District staff learned that Hunter, while on his way to a fireworks stand in Lehigh Acres, observed an unattended fire in a trash receptacle on the side of a residence. While some people would just drive by, or maybe just call 911, Hunter sprang into action.

Hunter ran to the home from the street and immediately began banging on the door of the occupied home to alert them to the emergency. He then grabbed a nearby hose and started to extinguish the fire, suffering some minor burns on his legs in the process. The residents of the home began to come outside as the fire was extinguished.

The fire was reportedly caused by fireworks left in a recycling bin. Our District responded to a lot of these types of fires over the holiday weekend, and even responded to a 911 call for this fire, as it was called in by a passerby who couldn't provide an exact location. Hunter was efficient in his firefighting – by the time our engine arrived in the area to investigate, there was no fire or smoke observed in the neighborhood.

For his quick action, and willingness to risk his safety to help others,

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#### Right-On-Red, The Good, The Bad And The Ugly; Making Significant Progress Against Speeding By Sheriff Carmine Marceno

Roughly 50 years ago, states began permitting a right turn, following a complete stop, at a red light.

The decision was made, partly, as an effort to save fuel during a period where the United States was experiencing significant fuel shortages in the 1970s. In fact, the "Energy Policy and Conservation Act of 1975," in addition to setting minimum standards for vehicular fuel efficiency, stated that "in order for states to receive federal assistance for mandated conservation programs, they had to enact a traffic law or regulation which, to the maximum extent practicable consistent with safety, permits the operator of a motor vehicle to turn such vehicle right at a red stop light after stopping."

Whether or not this practice actually saves fuel remains unknown. What is known is that the practice is not "consistent with safety" and has resulted in countless accidents and fatalities.

The safe completion of a right turn on a red signal mandates a full and complete stop. Clearly, a complete stop requires that the vehicle ceases to move forward and that the vehicle is motionless for a detectible period of time.

This requirement is wholly overlooked and often ignored.

Most drivers planning on utilizing the "right-on-red" privilege naturally look only to the left to see if oncoming traffic will allow their right turn. Once a determination has been made to proceed, the driver begins the turn.

This approach fails to assess conditions to the right such as pedestrians and bicyclists. Keep in mind that pedestrians and bicyclists attempting to cross the roadway from the driver's right to the driver's left have a green "walk signal" inviting them to cross the street.

Today's larger passenger trucks often restrict visibility and drivers may not see children, shorter adults or individuals in wheelchairs who are attempting to cross.

Often, in an effort to clearly see oncoming traffic from the left, drivers advance into the crosswalk and completely block access to those attempting to cross.

Lastly, as a result of failing to accurately judge the speed of approaching vehicles, or proceeding with the assumption that oncoming traffic will slow to allow your vehicle to complete the right turn, drivers enter the intersection with insufficient clearance, forcing oncoming vehicles to brake abruptly or cause a collision.

Let's work together to make Lee County a safer place for all drivers, all bicyclists and all pedestrians by stopping completely prior to right-on-red turns and by taking a moment to inspect conditions to the right of our vehicles.
