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
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

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Autumn Pet Safety

It's officially Fall. The leaves are changing color, the weather is more pleasant, and the holiday season is upon us. We love this time of year and so do our pets. We must make sure that we protect our pets from hidden dangers of this season. Below are some tips to help keep your pets safe during the autumn months.

RODENTICIDES (RAT POISONS)

As the days are getting shorter and cooler, mice and rats will begin looking for a place to call their winter home. They are notorious for getting into garages and sheds to protect them from the elements over winter. To control unwanted visitors many homeowners will put out rat poisons. If you use these products in your home, make sure to keep them out of reach of pets. These chemicals are toxic and potentially deadly for your pets. There are several different types with different active ingredients. Whether your pet eats the poison directly or your pet ingests a poisoned rodent each of the products has the potential to kill your

If your pet has ingested a rodent or rat poison, they should be taken to your veterinarian immediately. Make sure to bring the label from the product (or a picture of the entire box) with you so your veterinarian can determine the right course of treatment for your pet.

Remember, when placing this product around your home make sure to keep it away from all your pets and quickly pick up any deceased rodents around your yard to prevent accidental ingestion and exposure to these poisons.

PLANT AND MUSHROOM **POISONING**

Mushrooms tend to pop up around this time of the year. While not all mushrooms are poisonous, it can be hard to tell which ones are safe. For this reason, it is best to consider all mushrooms growing in your yard or out in nature

If you see mushrooms growing in your yard, pick them from the root and throw them out. Scan your vard for them frequently as mushrooms seem to pop up overnight. Also, look out for mushrooms when you take your pets for a walk.

If your pet does munch on a mushroom, call your vet immediately. Mild toxicity can cause gastrointestinal upset, like vomiting and diarrhea. Severe toxicity can cause neurological, kidney, and liver damage, or even death depending on what type of mushroom was eaten.

Chrysanthemum flowers, although very pretty, are toxic. If your pet ingests any part of the chrysanthemum plant it can cause an upset stomach, vomiting, diarrhea, drooling, unsteady uncoordinated movements, and skin rashes.

Any part of the Autumn Crocus plant is extremely toxic to your pet. It can cause multi-system organ damage to the lungs, stomach, kidneys, liver, and nervous system. Symptoms can include loss of appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, bloody diarrhea, weakness, seizures, and even death.

ANTIFREEZE

Fall is usually the time when some pet owners change the antifreeze in their vehicles to keep them running smoothly. But this product is highly toxic and should be kept far out of your pets reach. Antifreeze contains a chemical called ethylene glycol and pets are attracted to its sweet taste. However, if a pet ingests even a small amount, there can be serious, and even fatal, consequences. Signs of early poisoning include acting drunk or uncoordinated, excessive thirst, and

If you fear your pet has ingested antifreeze, take them to your veterinarian or your local emergency hospital immediately for treatment with an antidote to prevent acute kidney failure.

Clean up spills of antifreeze immediately. You may also consider switching to propylene glycol-based coolants. They are not completely nontoxic, but they are much less toxic than other engine cool-

ALCOHOL

Whether you are sipping a hard apple cider or enjoying your favorite mixed drink, pets should never be given alcohol. It depresses the nervous system and can also be damaging to the kidneys. Warning signs your pet has consumed alcohol include vomiting, disorientation, and difficulty urinating. Other more serious signs include collapse and coma.

Call your vet immediately if your pet has consumed alcohol. The best remedy is to not expose your pet to alcohol. Call your veterinarian if you notice your pet is acting lethargic or has vomiting or diarrhea. These could be signs your pet has ingested something they shouldn't have. Talk to your veterinarian, even if you are not sure you should bring your pet in for evaluation.

Stay safe and keep your pets safe.

If your furry kid has had contact or ingested any of the items on this list call your veterinarian for help immediately. If your pet has been exposed to something you are not sure of and it is not on this list, contact one of the Animal Poison Centers below.

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LAFCRD Plans for Future Training Facility By Fire Chief Robert Dilallo



The Lehigh Acres Fire Control and Rescue District has big plans for a 7.6-acre plot off Williams Avenue. The sale of this property, owned by the county, was recently approved

by the Lee County Board of Commissioners. This centrally located site is an ideal location for a training facility, as it will allow for multi-company scenarios while keeping crews inside the District. Currently, individual crews are sent out of Lehigh Acres to other facilities in the county for required training. This is detrimental to both the firefighters and the community, as it takes a station out of service while also not providing our firefighters with the opportunity to train as a team for their response to structure or other fires.

The new site is large enough to house a training facility and serve as a site for a future fire station (the nearest fire station to this site is approximately 4 miles away). This training facility was initially planned for the large parcel of land behind Station 102, but that land was determined to be better suited for sale as commercial prop-

erty. While construction on the training facility is scheduled to begin in 2024, a new station would not be added to the location in the near future. Currently, a site at the corner of Leonard Blvd S and Owen Ave is in development for the next scheduled fire station, Station 107. New station sites are determined by call volume and identified needs within our Fire District.

The addition of a training facility within our community will also have a positive impact on our District's ISO rating. ISO is an independent organization that provides communities and businesses with various rating and evaluation services throughout the United States. The purpose of an ISO public protection survey is to gather information to determine a Public Protection Classification (PPC®), which insurers use for underwriting and to calculate premiums for fire insurance. The Lehigh Acres Fire Control and Rescue District (District) maintains a rating classification from ISO of PPC 3 for parcels and structures within five (5) road miles of a District fire station and PPC 10 for all parcels and structures that are located more than five (5) road miles from a District fire station. The rating scale created by ISO notes the best possible classification as a "1," with "10" being the highest hazard risk rating.

The District's long-term goal is to improve our overall ISO rating to a 2 (two), which would be the best possible rating for our community. An important step to achieving this goal is to improve our training rating with the addition of a training facility inside the District. Additional information on our Public Protection Class rating can be found here on our website: https://bit.ly/LehighISO

Our District is currently experiencing an increase in new construction as well as a significant population increase. Within the last ten (10) years, the District has seen our overall call volume increase from 10,534 in 2013 to 16,746 responses in 2022, an increase of almost 59% in less than ten (10) years.

Our community acknowledged the need for additional services in Lehigh Acres when they voted in favor of a referendum to modify our District's fire assessment in 2020. Just as was planned in 2020 with the adjustment of the assessment, a new

station is being completed every 3 years. The addition of Station 106 has already had a positive impact on response times to brush fires in its area as well as across the District. Through responsible strategic planning, our current assessment model will continue to support future funding associated with the predicted growth.

The community of the Lehigh Acres Fire District is rapidly growing, and we are committed to continually improving the quality of emergency services delivered to its citizens. As we continue to grow together, we are honored to serve in a manner that reflects our core values; Excellence, Safety, Valor, Integrity, and Dedication.

THE DREAMER AND THE PLANNER

If you are The Dreamer, chances are you have lofty goals and are always talking about what you are going to do. You have plenty of grand and elaborate ideas of what you can achieve, but the problem is you have no specific plan to make it happen. The dreamer may spend more time conceptualizing than actually plotting out a viable plan of action to get there. Sadly, because of this, she may never fully realize her dreams. If this is you, please pay close attention to Quick Wins; this section is for you.

OUICK WINS AND MASSIVE ACTIONS

In addition to traffic operations in other areas of Lee County, our Traffic Unit continues to work diligently, at all hours, in response to complaints related to reckless speeding in and around our East District.

Over the last thirty-day period, 36 traffic operations have been devoted specifically to the State Road 82, Gateway


Boulevard, Griffin Drive, Treeline Parkway and Daniels Parkway roadways.





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
